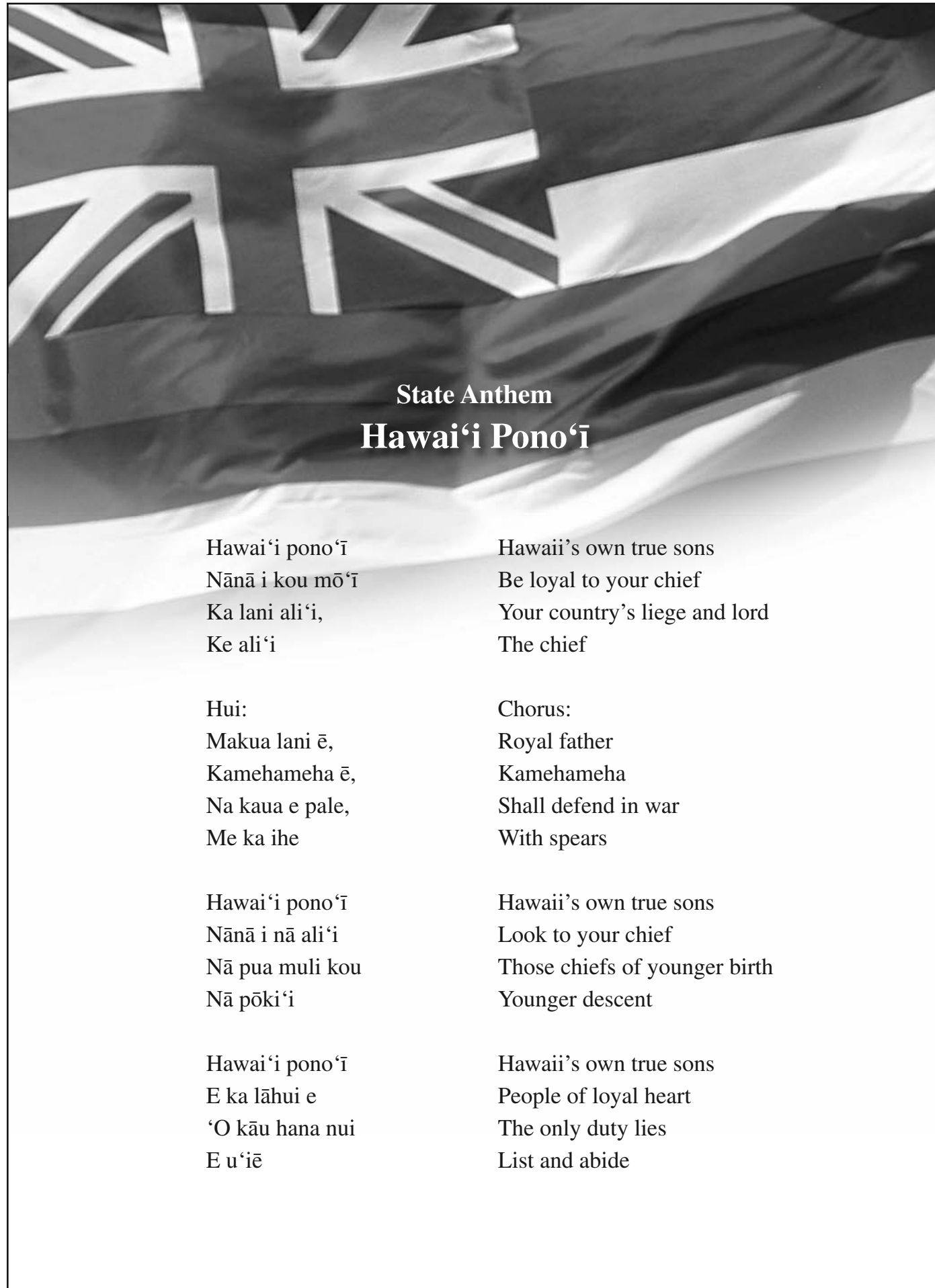

Five years ago when we hosted the first Hawaii Invitational, we decided to honor Hawaii Olympians. We wanted to continue their legacy so that our swimmers of today, do not forget the great swimmers who came from Hawaii, and represented our small islands at the Olympic games.

This year we will honor a very brave and talented young Hawaii champion, Daren Choi. We welcome everyone and thank you all for joining us this year. Daren, who will be a junior at Pearl City High School this year, was injured in a fall, while site seeing and hiking, in Samoa, after attending the Oceania Games in June 2010. Daren was one of Hawaii’s elite swimmers selected to represent the United States at the Oceania Games.

Daren is home in Hawaii, undergoing extensive physical therapy at The Rehabilitation Hospital of the Pacific. Daren is in for a long, hard and expensive course of treatment to recover and regain his strength. The progress Daren has made in a short time has been nothing short of a miracle. When Daren first came home, he had very little movement in his body from the neck down. A few days ago, Daren took 16 steps on his own. Daren’s spirit and courage is infectious when you visit him in his hospital room. Each day his therapists challenge Daren; each day Daren succeeds in meeting their challenge.

We honor Daren and recognize him at this swim meet. From a young age, Daren was breaking and setting records. We felt inspired to help the Choi family, in this small way by honoring Daren.

We welcome all swimmers competing this weekend from Hawaii, Hong Kong, China and Japan. We hope that you each attain your personal best and have a great weekend of competition!

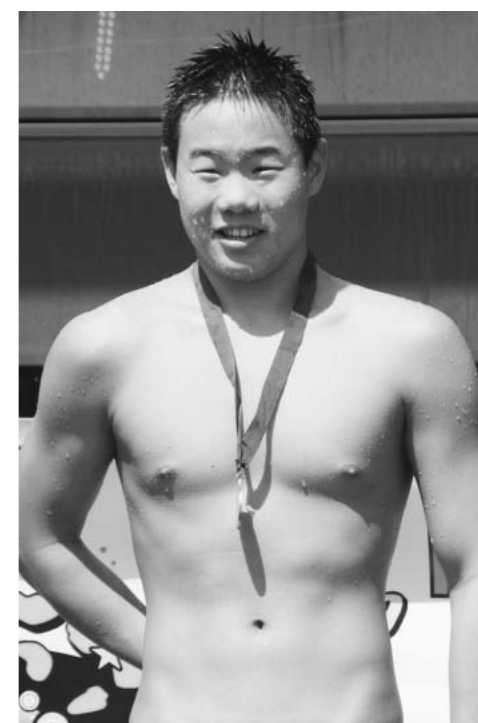
Daren Choi

2010 Oceania Championships, with 3 medals, Choi was the most decorated individual Hawaii athlete among competitors from 13 different countries at the 8th Annual Oceania Swimming Championships in Western Samoa.

Choi had placed third in three events—the 50, 100, and 200 back—recording his personal best times and also achieving highly-coveted U.S. National times in each event for the first time in his career. The 16-year old achieved those marks in competition against 19- and 20-year olds who are headed for the upcoming Olympic trials.

Earlier this year, as a Pearl City High School sophomore, Choi set records in the 200 individual medley and 100 butterfly at the OIA West Division Championships and broke records that had stood since 1987 in the 50 and 100 free at the OIA Championships.

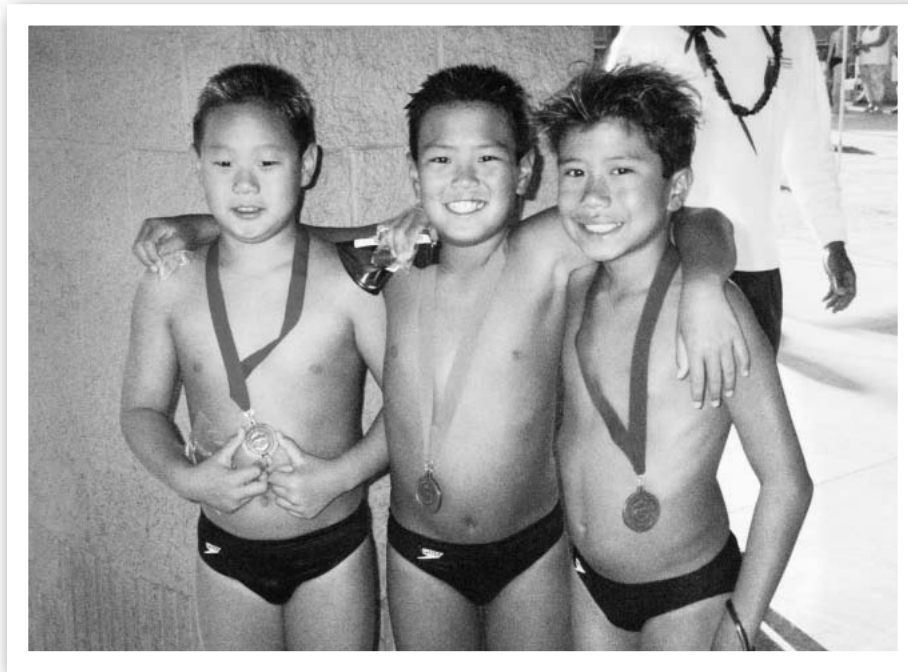

He participated in many upper level meets at a young age such as Age Group Sectionals, our Hawaii State Championship meets, and Western Zones. All the while, Daren continued to make friends throughout the swimming community. He continued to amaze everyone, myself included, with his growing speed, strength, and cool composure. Although every now and then I would see that hot headedness come through and it would remind me of once while training at Waikele, Daren and I got into an argument over a kick board when I took his and he flipped out and yelled at me, "GIVE ME MY BOARD BACK". Later when he took my kick board by mistake, I took advantage of the situa-

tion and yelled back at him "GIVE ME MY BOARD!!" Daren didn't laugh. Not outwardly anyway.

Daren attends Pearl City High School where he will be an upcoming junior. While swimming at Pearl City, he has broken many records such as the 50 and the 100 yard freestyle record at the 2010 OIA champs, and also took first at the High School States, also becoming an All-American achieving that award in the 100 yard freestyle. Swimming has taken Daren all around the US and abroad to represent himself, his team, and his family and racing people all over the world.

While being at the hospital with Daren everyday, one of the things I have enjoyed watching is how the people who come to visit him are actually getting to know each other and are making new friends themselves while there visiting Daren. When one person

can bring a group of people together like Daren does, I believe that is truly unbelievable.

Daren loves to swim and hang out with friends, but mainly loves to swim. People believe it is his love for swimming and his drive that can push him to regain his strength and soon be back in the water doing what he used to do before, which was to have fun and race. He now fights hard trying to rebuild his strength everyday to do the things we do on a regular basis. With Daren's great heart and determination, I believe he will be back in no time. My family and I pray every day for Daren and his family as we know there is still a long road ahead for all of them.

I've known Daren for a long time; he is a great teammate but an even better friend. Someone like Daren comes around once in a lifetime. We're here for YOU now Daren.

When we were little, Daren and I wouldn't always get along. However, as we grew older and more mature, our friendship also grew stronger. When our

sisters got their driver's licenses, we all hung out a lot, playing at the beach, downing bubble drinks, going down the Chois' stairs on the boogie board and having intense ab workouts from all the laughing.

Seeing someone everyday and carpooling to and from practice can really make you learn a lot about that person. In time, I found out what kind of person Daren really is. He is thoughtful, understanding, and fun to be around. He's pretty much down to do whatever, except scary movies and anything haunted. I'm pretty sure he thought the

Harry Potter movies were scary. Some of the KSC swimmers went to Seven Bridges after our banquet one year and he was holding onto everybody like a ghost was after him. Daren is so funny and he doesn't even know it. His sister Shanelle and I have a slight problem with anger management on the road, but Daren is another story. I don't think I've met a calmer driver than him. If a car is going too slow or cuts him off, he simply says, "Come on! What was that?" He then turns to us and asks if that was road rage. We answer together, "No Daren, far from it." I feel that he's not only my friend and teammate, he's my brother.

Watching Daren go through therapy and making tremendous progress everyday is truly the most amazing thing I've ever seen. I'm inspired by his courage, strength, and determination. He puts all of his heart and effort into rehab; it makes me want to be the best I can be in whatever I do in life too. I'm proud of him and lucky to have him as my friend.

What is equally incredible is seeing so many people reach out to help in the most awesome ways. I lived in a very small world until now. My outlook on life and people has changed drastically.

Thank you HSC and the Arakaki family for letting me share my thoughts with you. Swimming in the Daren Choi Invitational will be an extra special experience with memories to last a lifetime. This is the biggest challenge Daren has ever faced, but he won't have to do it alone. I'm here for him along with hundreds of his other brothers and sisters.

Veterans' Memorial Aquatic Center Facility Rules

1. ALL ATHLETES AND SWIMMER NEED TO SHOWER BEFORE ENTERING THE POOL
2. NO FOOD OR DRINKS ON MAIN POOL DECK
Except for Meet Officials, Volunteers, and Coaches during scheduled competition events. Spectators and events participants may have food and drinks in bleacher and grass area where team tent are set up. Athletes may use plastic water bottles for re-hydration on pool deck.
3. BULK HEADS ARE OFF LIMITS TO ALL SPECTATORS AND SWIMMERS
Only Meet Officials, Facility Personal and Coaches are permitted on the bulkhead during the course of the meet and scheduled practice times. Exception: swimmers who are assisting during distance events.
4. DIVING WELL IS CLOSED DURING SWIMMING EVENTS
Only during short course season. All Diving Boards are closed except for diving competitions and practice.
5. BLEACHER AREA, PLEASE KEEP A 3-4 FOOT WALK PATH ALONG HAND RAIL
